## MERRY ALPHABET.




A was an Archer who shot at a frog

O you should have heard it Bow-wow!




was a Captain all covered with lace, With sword and with trinkets to rattle;

And when they were ill he gave them a pill, And soon their diseases were mended.






E is an Engineer firm at his post, To rules and to signals no stranger;

He could rake, he could hoe, he could reap, he could mow,


And was proud of his farm with good reason.




G was a Glutton who ate like a pig, With his nose quite into the platter;

Were glad when his reign was over.


L was a Lady who had a white hand All covered with beautiful rings;


She could knit, she could sew, she could play, and I know

Do many more lady-like things.












was a Miser who hoarded up gold,

O was the Organ that stood in the church:




O was the Organ that stood in the church;

For their favorite game of Lawn Tennis.




S was a Sailor who followed the Sea,

U---an Umbrella was borne o'er the head


Of a dear little Urchin, named Billy,
