Miss Peggy Possum had taught





Possum family, and was considered to be very well educated, not only by her own family, but by a host of admiring friends.




about his salary, and



Consequently his progress was slow and his ma was continually threatening to take him out. On the night that school opened,






E had perfectly dreadful teeth. And, besides, he had such claws!

hidden his lunch under a big leaf, on which he had then proceeded to sit down.







For eating in school hours was strictly forbidden.

HO were appointed to act as monitors for the whole season. This was considered very unfair, and caused much grumbling.









As he could think of nothing to recite, and feeling very anxious to know if his lunch, like the flag, was still there, he sat down very suddenly and very flat,

This so enraged the guinea pig that he reached over and, snatching away Peter Rabbit's leaf,








EGGY Possum now declared the first class to be over, and as the pupils were loudly demanding their voice lesson, she called for the old bull-frog, who did not appear to be present.

that the tree-toads went off in the sulks, whereupon Peggy Possum declared the second class to be over.




During all this time
