

Upon your clothes and burn them brown?







BILLY BULLDOG

He raises lovely cabbage green


The handsomest you've ever seen.

Just because he looked so wise.




FISHERMAN CAT

And a foolish tail that seemed all wrong.




CUBBY BEAR

A gay old Wolf was an actor bold


Playing parts both new and old,

He never could play Red Ridinghood.




JAGUAR.

MUSIC MONKEY


Down the street is a Monkey Boy
