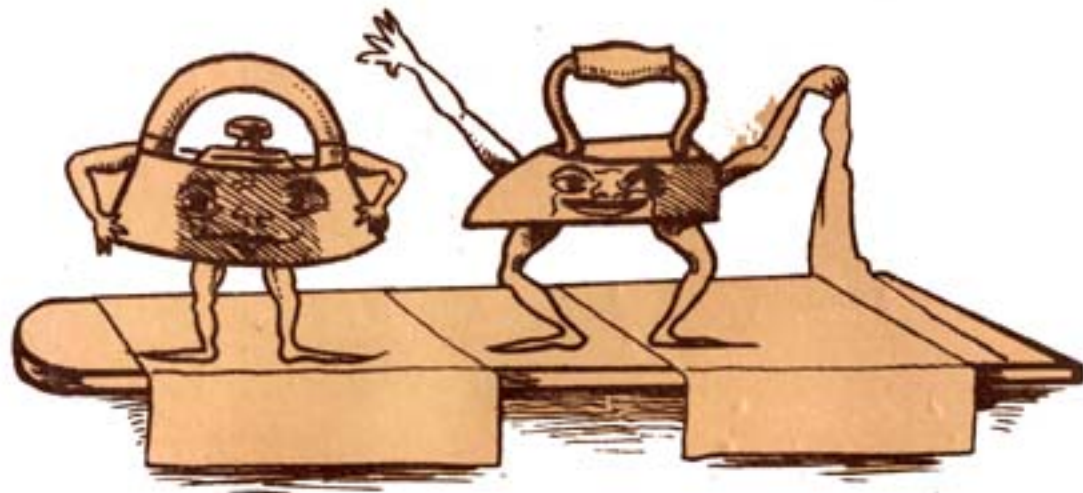

Where all nice little doggies play

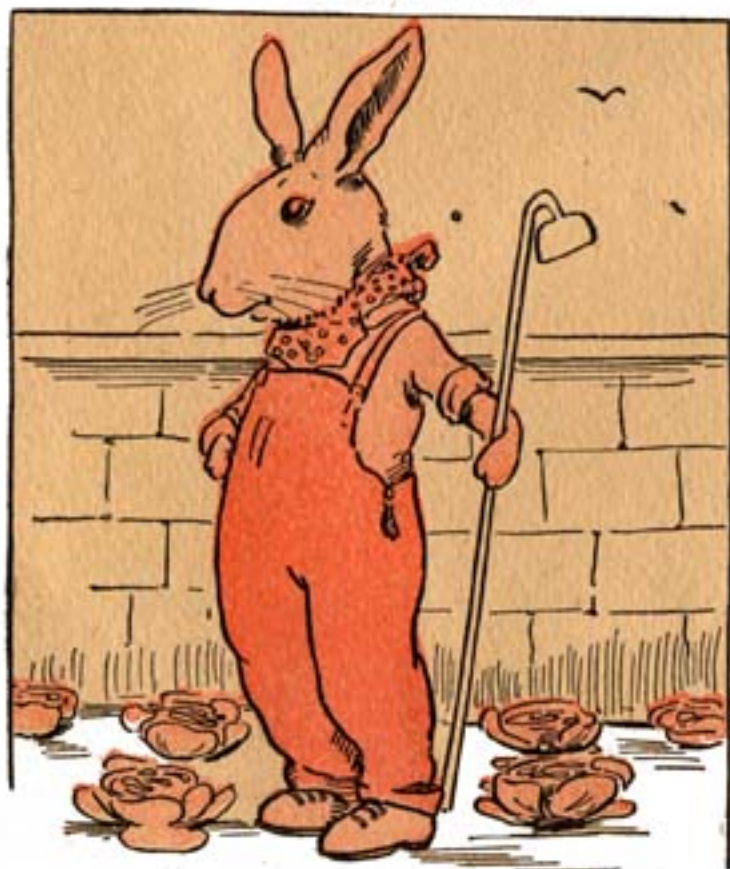
But where the neighborhood is rough

You may be sure that he is there



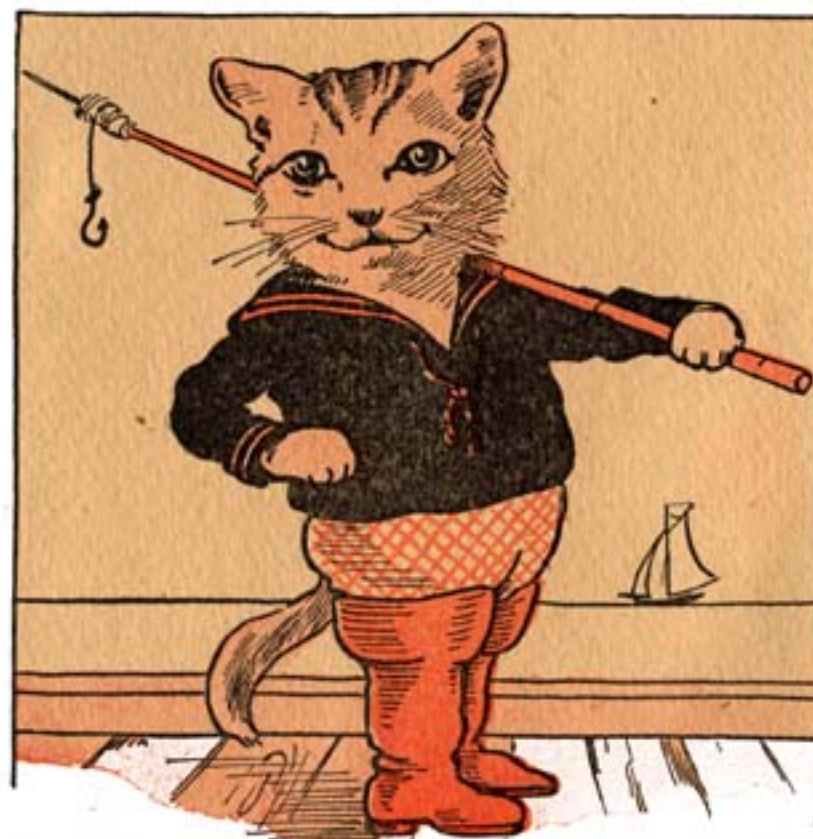
**IBIS**

No warbling singing voice is his



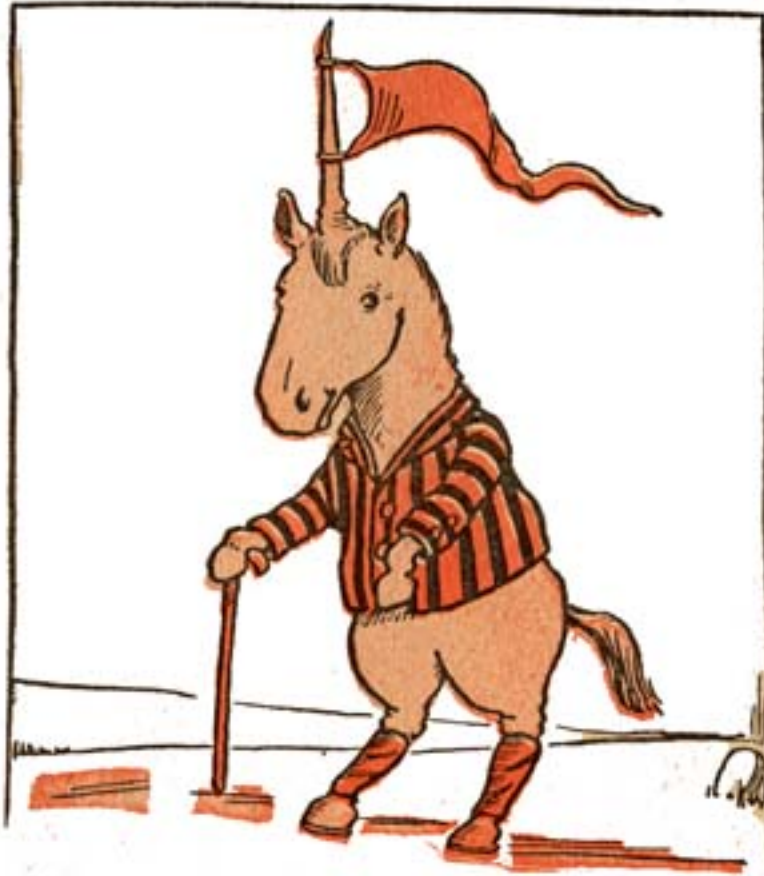
**FOOLISH OWL**

We'll catch some fish far out at sea.



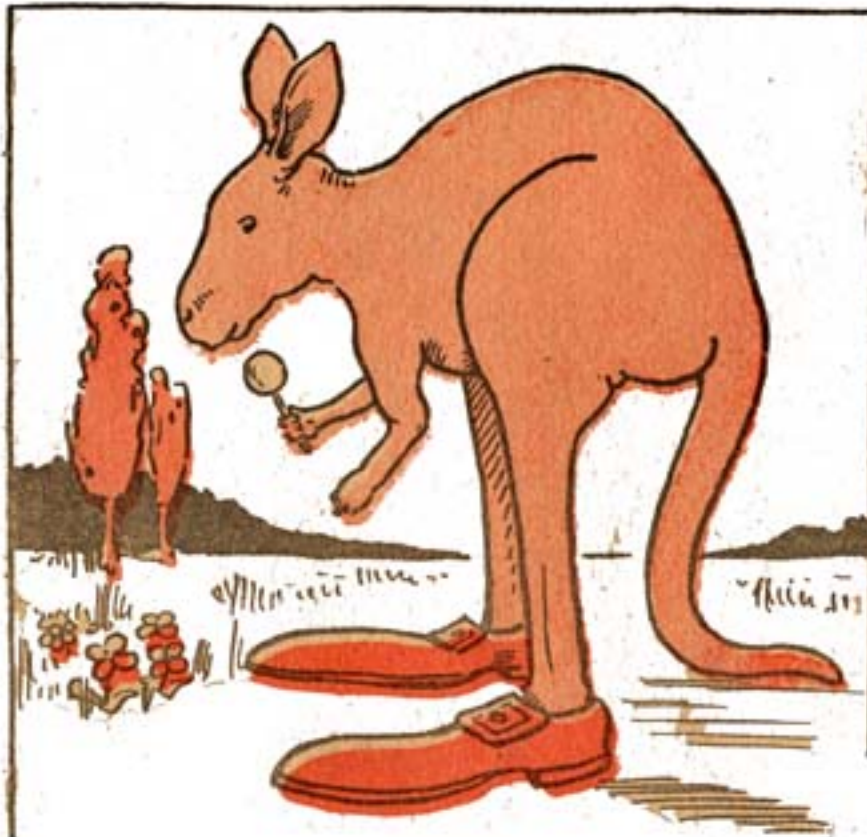
#### UNICORN

And a foolish tail that seemed all wrong.

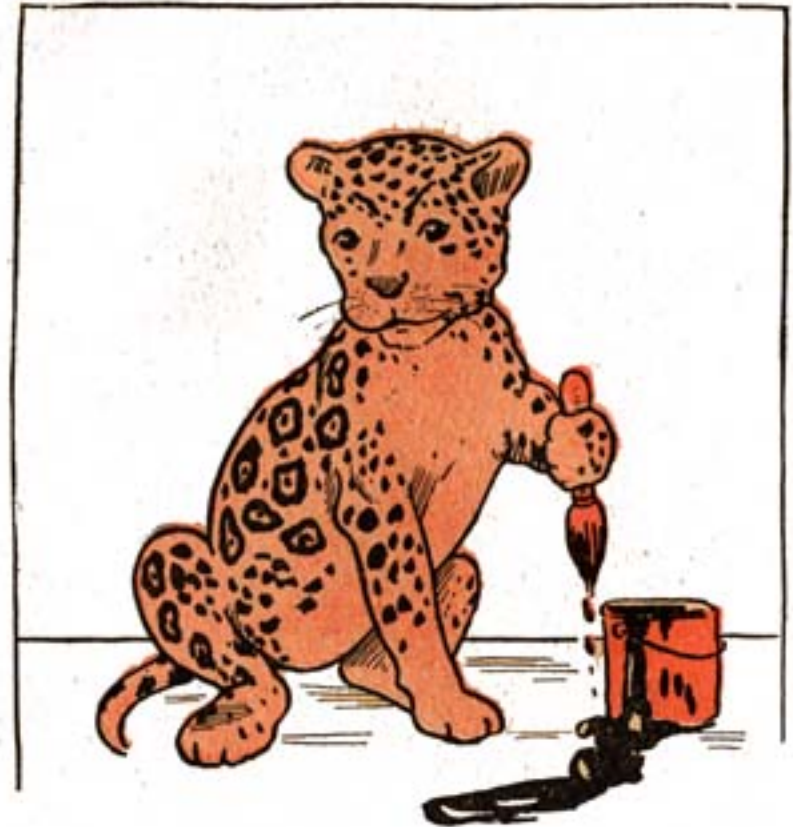


#### YAK

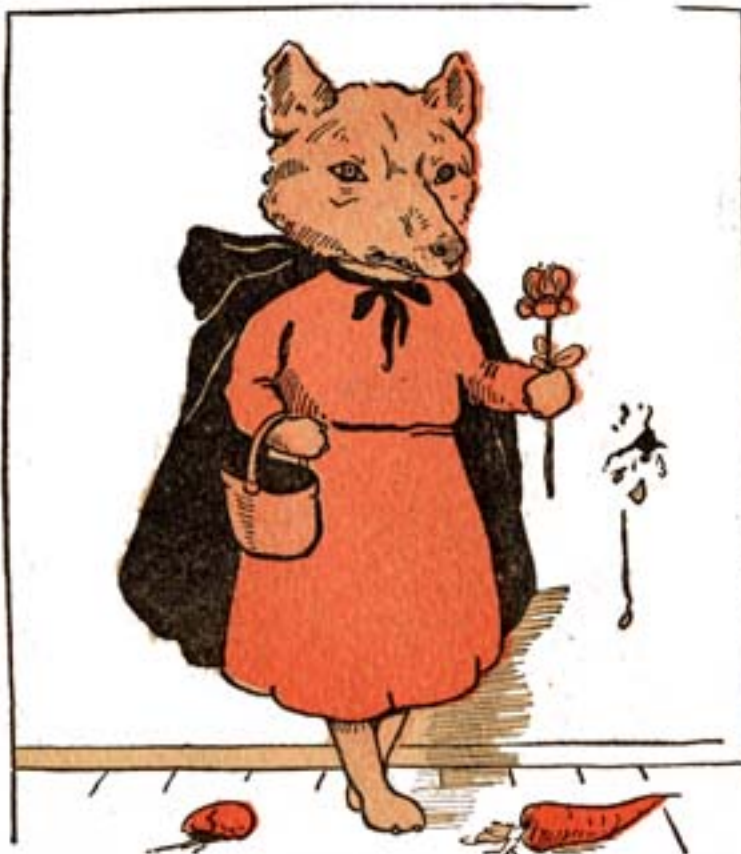
Going up to bed at night
